Take Action for Equitable Vaccine Distribution!!

As vaccines are rolled out in many – mostly wealthy – countries, Physicians for Human Rights (PHR) is pushing for a just and equitable distribution, grounded in science, ethics, and human rights. A global vaccine will only be effective if no one is left behind.

Widespread uptake and equitable distribution of vaccines is one of the most pressing issues of our time. Not only is it the right thing to do – it's also the only way to try to end the pandemic. Until everyone is vaccinated across the globe, people will continue to get sick and die, variants will continue to develop and spread uncontrollably, and the darkness we experienced over the last year will linger.

To that end, in the coming months, the PHR team will be focusing its efforts on advocating for the just and equitable manufacture and distribution of vaccines globally and within the United States. Specifically, PHR will be prioritizing the following three issues:

- \* Protecting frontline health care workers who continue to risk their health and safety to treat and protect others;
- \* Protecting marginalized and historically disadvantaged communities who are most at-risk and least likely to be protected from the virus or treated if they become sick; and
- \* Ensuring an equitable global production and distribution of vaccines by advocating for adequate funding for resource-constrained settings to acquire a fair share of vaccines and to ensure free and fair distribution.

Arm in arm, we must stand together to demand vaccine equity now, which is why PHR is partnering with Oxfam America and other leading human rights organizations in pushing for a People's Vaccine.

Left to Right: Sister Marcella Maria Garus served as President of Villa Maria College from 1978 to 2018. A total of 40 years. Sister served at the college for a total of 50 years! Sister Mary Pachomia Lenda was president of the college from 1967 to 1978. The first president was Mother Mary Annette Guzowski from 1961 to 1967. She lived another 30 years, dying in 1997 at the age of 104!



On Friday, March 12 at 11:15 am in the college auditorium we will hold a Memorial Mass for Sister Mary DeAngelis Nowak. Sister died at the age of 86 on December 14, 2020 from complications of COVID-19. Beginning in 1978, she spent 32 years at Villa Maria College serving as Vice President for Business Affairs.
