SUPPORT THE DIGNITY ACT:

Congress recently introduced the Dignity Act of 2025 (H.R.4393), a bipartisan proposal that seeks just, humane immigration reform. The Dignity Act addresses border security, provides a path to lawful residency, and includes crucial protections for families and vulnerable individuals. KEEP THE ENDANGERMENT FINDING:

The US Environmental Protection Agency is proposing to rescind the "endangerment finding." The "endangerment finding" was established in recognition that greenhouse gases threaten public health and therefore, allows the government to regulate gas emissions. The purpose of rescinding the finding is to remove regulations that limit greenhouse gas emissions for business and industry. The proposal questions the validity of climate science including those by experts in the field. The federal administration's energy agenda focuses on fossil fuel expansion. This action would remove all regulations in one action instead of weakening regulations one by one.

The EPA has initiated a 45-day comment period. Franciscan Action Network, among other Catholic groups, is participating. Action is needed now to collect signatures in opposition to this legislation.

Hispanic Heritage Month 2025

Each year, Americans observe National Hispanic Heritage Month from September 15 to October 15, by celebrating the histories, cultures, and contributions of American citizens whose ancestors came from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean and Central and South America.

The observation started in 1968 as Hispanic Heritage Week under President Lyndon Johnson and was expanded by President Ronald Reagan in 1988 to cover a 30-day period starting on September 15 and ending on October 15. It was enacted into law on August 17, 1988, on the approval of Public Law 100-402

The day of September 15 is significant because it is the anniversary of independence for Latin American countries Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua. In addition, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days on September 16 and September18, respectively. Also, Columbus Day or Día de la Raza, which is October 12, falls within this 30 day period. Click here to learn more.
